Much Ado About 'Nothing': μηδέν and τὸ μὴ ἔόν in Parmenides

It is, to my knowledge, a universally accepted assumption among temporary commentators that μηδέν, 'nothing', and τὸ μὴ ἔόν, 'not', function as synonyms in Parmenides' poem.¹ In this paper I shall focus primarily on the central role this supposed semantic equivalence plays in arguments supporting an emendation in line 12 of fragment 12. Despite this scholarly unanimity regarding the synonymy of the two terms,
